

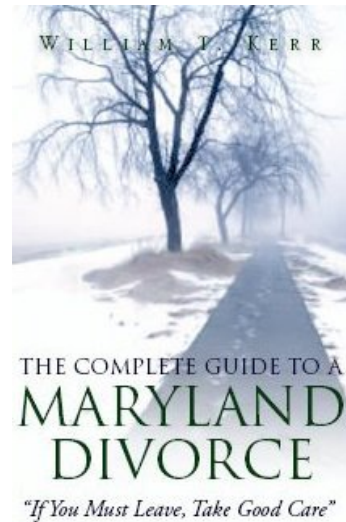
People don't have to endure the divorce process.

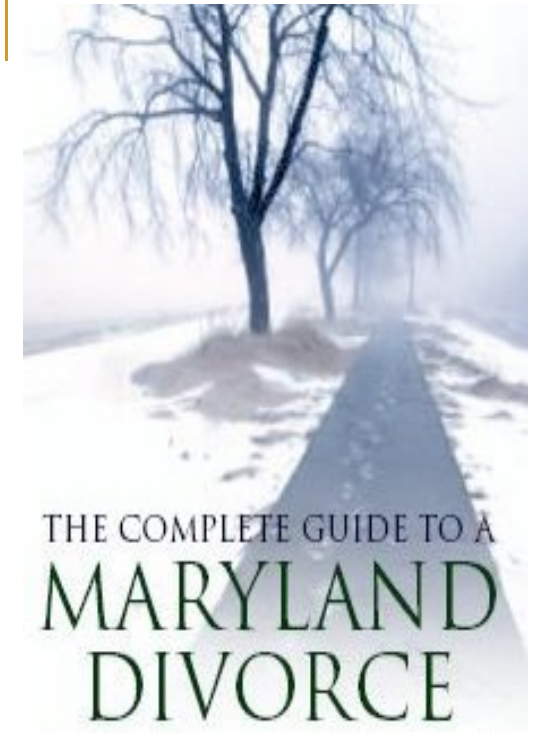
